About:

Every Monday of king salmon season, the Kuskokwim River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission (KRITFC) and Yukon Delta National Wildlife Refuge (YDNWR) co-host a river-wide teleconference for fishermen along the Kuskokwim River to call in and discuss fishing regulations, closures and openers, fish camp updates, Traditional Knowledge, and management action. This call is held toll-free on Zoom and open to the public. In 2021, it will be held Mondays at 10am from May 17 to July 12.

Summary:

- The Federal government at USFWS is still managing the river. There are drift and set net opportunities for subsistence fishermen on Friday July 9 and July 16 and set net opportunities on the weekends of July 10-11 and July 17-18.
- Red salmon are abundant on the Kuskokwim right now. Everyone is grateful.
- Fishermen at the mouth of the river are predicting more chum coming soon.

Full Notes:

- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Good morning. Usually we're done with these calls by this time of year, because usually the State is managing.
- Boyd Blihovde USFWS/YDNWR: Good morning. There's plenty of reds out there, so I don't feel as concerned about them. I went out fishing and caught some yesterday by dipnet for the first time ever. All reds, that's all we saw. They were jumping out of the water and everything.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: I totally agree, there are so many reds. That river is just full.

- Jim Simon KRITFC: I just got back from Eagle, and it was a good trip, but very sad to be on the river
 with no salmon fishing happening. Thank goodness for Kuskokwim River sockeye. They don't have
 them on the Yukon.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: That's true. My mother-in-law is sending all kinds of stuff to people from Scammon Bay.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: Good morning. I was just dialing the Working Group number and it told me to wait, so I looked up the number again and I was calling the wrong one. Pretty wet down here, the wind's from the south, 19 mph, and humidity is 99%.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Yeah, we've got four fans going in our smokehouse to dry the fish I caught on Friday. How do you keep yours from turning sour, Adolph? Is anyone still drying down there?
- **Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak:** Yes, the people went down on Friday to the Kuskokwim River, and they're drying right now. Well, not drying, but getting moist.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: I was going to say. The only thing that works for me is to use electric fans to make fake wind, but I don't think everyone does that.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: We didn't hang lots of fish because I knew it'll be hard drying. We need to space out drying the fish to dry in this kind of weather.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Are most people done fishing and putting away dryfish down there?
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: No, they'll wait for good drying weather again. They'll fish. The ones with the big families, they're still fishing. They'll hang red salmon, those are good for the winter, too.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: I was telling my husband the other day that the Yup'ik word for "cutting fish" is
 "seg," and it's an onomatopoeia. Every sound my uluaq makes when I cut my fish sounds like "seg, seg,
 seg." It's funny.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: Yeah, there's lots of words like that.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: So, Adolph, you know that there's drift fishing the next 2 Fridays, and then on the weekends, they're allowing set netting on the main stem.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: Yes, we're looking forward to drift netting on July 9. For us at the mouth of the Kuskokwim, set netting is pretty hard. I never bother to set net, unless I find a right good spot that doesn't have a strong current.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Yeah, it's hard down there. I think from Napakiak on up they set net, right?
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: Yeah, from Fowler Island or something up there.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Okay. We don't have much to report. It's just really good red fishing around here. Boyd went dipnetting.
- Boyd Blihovde USFWS/YDNWR: I went out with my family and was able to get 6 reds right away, just in front of Bethel. I told an experienced fisherman about it, and he said he'd be scared to put a drift net in right now, that it would be full of so many reds.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: Do the people up there have fish camps? Maybe that's where most people went this morning, to check on their fish racks.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Yeah, my husband is checking on ours right now. I finally have a full smokehouse, I'm very happy.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: There's lots of reds going up and few chums going up right now. In the past they usually peak around July 3 and 4.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: Yeah. I've caught 2 chum all summer, that's all.

- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: We got 3 chums too. People around here, they say there's more coming in. I'm expecting them starting this week.
- Mary Peltola KRITFC: And they dry fast! That's the good thing about chums. Well, we don't really have anything else.
- Adolph Lupie Tuntutuliak: Let's call it a day, then!
